Executive Director's Report

This year has been a busy one for everyone associated with In-Definite Arts. With over 150 artists attending each week, it's been a year filled with classes, exhibitions, awards, social events, workshops, sales and most of all – incredible artwork!

We continue to contract with Calgary Region PDD to provide programs four days per week for 52 artists in total on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays and 65 artists in total on Tuesdays.

Thanks are extended to our contract specialist Sarah Noble for all her help and support over the past year and to Dr. Alex Hillyard, CEO of Calgary Region PDD.

In addition to this core programming, In-Definite Arts has collaborated with a number of external agencies over the past year. We continue to provide programs two days per week for Artistic Expressions and recently have added another AE session on Friday mornings. Thanks to Leslie Wilkins and the Artistic Expressions Board of Directors for continuing this partnership with us. IDAS has also been offering programs on Fridays to other agencies interested in booking studio time, including ongoing service provision to the clients of Options.

This year marked the unveiling of “A Meaningful Life”, an art project achieved through collaboration between the artists of Prospect/ Studio C and In-Definite Arts, as well as other community partners. This has been a three year undertaking and the completed sculpture will now tour throughout Alberta in the years that follow. IDAS was pleased to work with Arthouse Productions during this process, a film company in Edmonton that created two videos about the project.

Also in the winter of 2012, In-Definite Arts was proud to announce

the launch of its newly designed website! Our sincerest thanks are extended to Studio Y Creations for this beautiful gift. In particular, thank you to David Nolan, President of Studio Y, and designers Laura Hardie and Victoria Mitchell for their vision and dedication.

Traditionally this report has been one where the Executive Director gives thanks for the work done over the past year. Not wanting to break with tradition, I have compiled the following list of “thank yous”.

For financial contributions to our program I would like to thank the Persons with Developmental Disabilities, Calgary Region Community Board; Alberta Foundation for the Arts; Calgary Arts Development; Canada Council of the Arts; Alberta Government – Community Spirit Program; Calgary Attendance Centre; Artistic Expressions and the individual artists and friends of In-Definite Arts who donated so generously this past year. In addition, thanks are extended to Telus for funding towards Art Works!, our after school art program for children.

Thank you to Kate Daniel, Community Recreation Coordinator with the Community & Neighbourhood Services at the City of Calgary for all the help and support she has given us this past year. Kate is our connection with the City and makes sure that we’re well informed on what’s happening around our neighbourhood and beyond.

Thank you to the Fairview Community Association for their support over this year, especially to their president Donna Wynnychuk who helps us in so many ways. The community association has been helping to fund the after school children’s art programs over the

past year and has recently confirmed a large donation to us for our lower level renovations which should begin in the fall.

For contributions toward our renovations I would like to give special thanks to Kasian Architecture and Design. We’re pleased to have the parking lot restoration almost completed and to be moving forward with plans for the lower level. In addition, funding for renovations and the parking lot were contributed by the City of Calgary – Capital Conservation Grant and the Alberta Government – Community Facilities Enhancement Program.

For contributions of time and talent, I would like to thank the many volunteers who work in the studio, as receptionists, with fund-raising, on the Board of Directors and committees, and in addition, the workers from the Calgary Attendance Centre who help with cleanup and outdoor maintenance.

I would like to thank our incredible In-Definite Arts staff; these are the individuals who carry out the work of In-Definite Arts. They are a group who daily go above and beyond the duties of their job descriptions. Despite the many challenges they often face they manage to remain positive throughout it all. I know I join with the Board of Directors and each artist here in giving them our thanks for their work over the past year.

In closing, a special thanks to all our artists, their families and support partners for their support over the past year. Art is a universal language and is used by each of our artists to share their unique life stories. I feel privileged to work here and to be a part of their In-Definite Arts experience.

Mission

The In-Definite Arts Society is a unique creative arts centre that promotes opportunities for people with developmental disabilities to express themselves and to grow and develop through their involvement in art. We strive to increase awareness in the community about the talents and diversity of artists with disabilities.



IDAS is committed to supporting people with developmental disabilities to become working artists, and to promoting their work as an emerging and increasingly important contribution to the professional arts world. What we've learned through many hours of dedicated service both in the classroom and out in the community is that our artists, like mainstream artists and professionals in other fields, need to be publicly recognized and valued for their work. For this reason IDAS offers a combination of visual arts training, professional development and dissemination programs that afford member artists the greatest opportunity for increased community participation and public impact.

As a result of IDAS' professionalization practices, artist-in-residencies and through the provision of a multi-disciplinary venue where our artists can pursue their own unique creative visions, IDAS delivers exceptional arts programming that promotes diversity in community members, community services and community arts.

What describes “A Meaningful Life”?

This Spring, In-Definite Arts was proud to participate in the unveiling of a collaborative public artwork that celebrates the cultural contributions of persons with disabilities to the Calgary community. Three-years in the making, the “A Meaningful Life” project presents a unique approach to public art, and a distinct way of working with persons with disabilities, their families, disability service providers and other public stakeholders in order to explore the creative inquiry: *How do persons with disabilities strengthen and add value to our community?*

Project Artistic Director Jeff de Boer, on “A Meaningful Life”:

“If we collaborate as a community, we create something greater than the sum of its parts; we create Meaning. As members of an enlightened community, we each enjoy ‘A Meaningful Life.’”

The completed project, a free-standing six foot long aluminum sculpture, is overlaid with a vibrant collage of twenty-four original artworks created by the artists of In-Definite Arts and Prospect/Studio C. Together these artworks (and the artists’ supporting narratives) reflect

unique life stories that brings significance to “a meaningful life”.

Eleven In-Definite Arts member artists collaborated on this art project, while the aluminum sculpture itself was designed and fabricated by IDAS Board member and accomplished Calgary artist, Jeff de Boer.

The art piece was unveiled, along with nearly all twenty-four original artworks, during a private celebration launch that toasted the artists, family members, community and project partners that contributed to the project’s success. In attendance were many of the contributing artists, as well as special guests including the Alberta Premier, Alison Redford. The sculpture is currently on tour, raising awareness about “A Meaningful Life”.

This 2011/12 has been an exceptional season for exhibitions at In-Definite Arts! Over the past year IDAS artwork has been shared through a diversity of venues throughout Calgary and area, including contributions to regional displays in Red Deer and Medicine Hat, as well as curated exhibitions in Cochrane, Spruce Grove and Okotoks.

The past year was similarly a momentous year of exhibitions on the international stage, beginning in March with IDAS' first juried cross-continental art show. The "Highway Code", on display in the Project Ability Gallery in the Trongate arts district of Glasgow, featured the artwork of four IDAS member artists and was achieved through collaboration with Project Ability (a like-minded Commonwealth organization) and two other Canadian art and disability organizations: the Nina Haggerty Centre in Edmonton, and the Garth Homer Society in Victoria. Similar international partnerships facilitated the inclusion of IDAS artwork in a juried international arts competition in Santa Monica, California and a non-juried event hosted in Siena Italy.

In total, surveying all of the professional exhibitions that were curated, coordinated or presented by IDAS over the past year, it can be said that IDAS artwork was shared with an audience of well over 500 000, through 28 formal exhibitions, public events and festivals. Congratulations to all of the artists who shared their talents with these diverse audiences.

IDAS Celebrates Alberta Arts Days

For the 2011 celebration of Alberta Arts Days (an annual province-wide commemoration of Alberta's arts and cultural communities), In-Definite Arts presented a free community art event exploring the theme "Many Hands Make a Community". On October 1, IDAS invited its artist membership, community partners and local artists/organizations to "connect their hands to their imagination" by contributing to a collaborative community banner that is now displayed on the chain link fence in front of the IDAS facility.

Creative Collaborations

In the summer of 2011, In-Definite Arts was pleased to welcome the staff of the Nina Haggerty centre (a like-minded organization based in Edmonton) to the IDAS studios to share best practices. IDAS also had the pleasure of visiting the NH studios in June to meet the NH artists and tour their studio space. Inspired by these creative exchanges, In-Definite Arts and the Nina Haggerty Centre for the Arts now look forward to presenting a co-curated exhibition on the theme of 'Friendship' in each centre's respective galleries during the Fall of 2012.

Jane Cameron Archives Report

This Spring, In-Definite Arts was honored to participate in the first official World Down Syndrome Day (WDSD) celebration on March 21, 2012 at the UN Headquarters in New York City. The Conference “Building Our Future” set the stage for advocates, including self-advocates, to highlight recent achievements as well as new developments within the Down syndrome community. The Conference was followed by a nine-day art exhibition at the visual arts studio *28on27* that included a three-day program entitled “DOWNrightART: Abilities and Possibilities”. As part of the DOWNrightART Exhibition, In-Definite Arts was proud to share the artwork of former artist Jane Cameron alongside the current practices of twenty-two international artists with Down syndrome, including artists from Canada, the United States, the United Kingdom, Australia and Puerto Rico.

For the summer, In-Definite Arts now eagerly anticipates presenting a solo exhibition of Jane’s artwork, to be featured in the Leighton Art Centre July 21 to September 2, 2012. Building on the success of Jane’s artwork in New York, this exciting new exposition of Jane’s tapestries and drawings at the Leighton will signify over 4 decades of public presentations for Jane’s artwork. We hope you’ll join us as we celebrate this milestone at the Leighton reception on July 28, 2012.

Jane Cameron National Award

The In-Definite Arts Society and the Canadian Down Syndrome Society are proud to present the 2012 Jane Cameron National Award for Artists with Down Syndrome to IDAS member artist Christine Millson for her pottery artwork: “Summer Masterpiece”. Honorable mention is awarded to IDAS artist Daniel Janzen.

Jane Cameron In-House Award

Each year the Archives also presents an award to an outstanding artist in the In-Definite Arts program. Last year’s winner was Patsy F, for her inspired embroidery “The Hand”, which is now a part of the IDAS permanent collection. Honorable mentions were awarded to Gwyn H and Laura W. 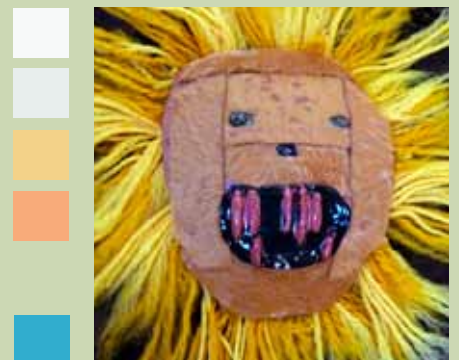

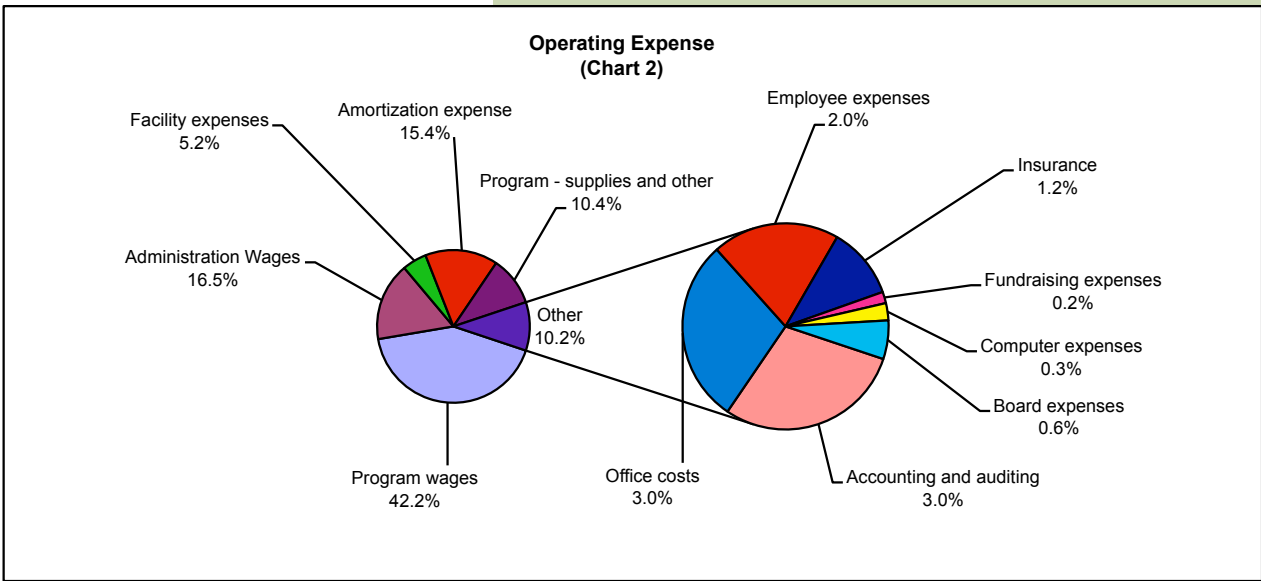
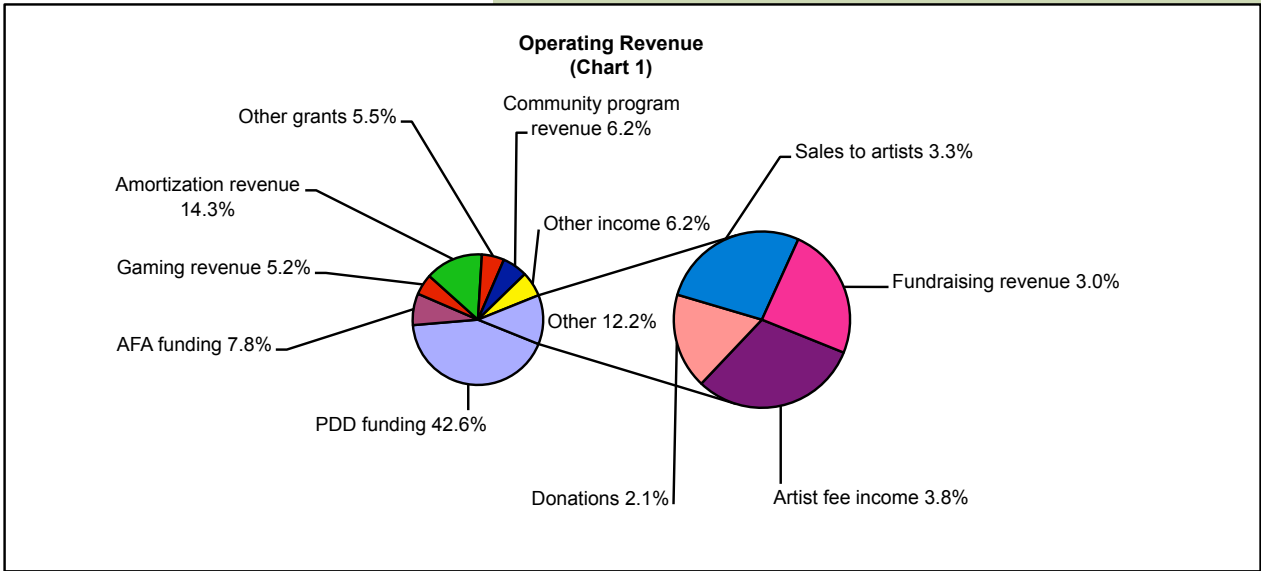
